

**METROPOLITAN COMMUNITY COLLEGE AREA
BOARD OF GOVERNORS
OFFICIAL MEETING MINUTES
JULY 22, 2025**

A meeting of the Board of Governors of the Metropolitan Community College Area was called to order at 6:30 PM.

Agenda Item 1 — Preliminaries

Agenda Item 1d — Announcement of Posted Location of Open Meetings Act

Following the Pledge of Allegiance, the Chair reported that a copy of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act had been posted in the rear of the room.

Agenda Item 1e — Recording of Notice of Public Meeting

The Chair then reported on the recording of the Notice of Public Meeting and stated the following:

1. *Proof of Publication, pursuant to Policy 10503 of the Board of Governors, in the form of an affidavit of an employee of the Omaha World-Herald, to the effect that notice of this meeting was published in that newspaper on July 11, 2025, and on the Omaha World-Herald's website.*

2. *Affidavit of College employee Cari Henry, to the effect that a copy of the published Notice of Meeting was transmitted to each member of the Board of Governors in a manner specified by Policy 10503 of the Board of Governors.*

The notice of the meeting stated that an agenda for this meeting, kept continually current, was available for public inspection at the principal office of the Board of Governors, Building No. 30, 30th and Fort Streets, Omaha, Nebraska, by making prior arrangements by calling 531-622-2415.

Without objection, the Chair of the Board ordered that the affidavits be attached to the minutes of the meeting and made a part of the official proceedings of the Board of Governors.

Agenda Item 2 — Public Comments

Daniel Richie said when people show you who they are, you have to listen. He expressed shock at Gotschall's comments and stated that a public servant who makes such remarks is unfit to hold that position.

Karin Waggoner thanked the Board and President Schmailzl for their commitment to public trust and showing the public what real leadership looks like. She hailed MCC as a treasure that deserves full protection – offering affordable, accessible, inclusive education; opening doors; changing lives. It reflects the best of what Omaha can offer. She stressed that respect matters, that women matter, and that Gotschall's participation in locker room talk was unacceptable. She said he cannot continue to lead and called for him to resign if he had any respect for the College.

Luis Jimenez expressed frustration at being unable to determine what was said or what the issue involved and added that he would like to know what the actual quotes were.

Lia Post stated that this is the second time she has had to raise safety concerns with the College on behalf of her daughter – the first time being during the recent ICE raid near South Omaha Campus. Her daughter, who attends MCC, is disabled, nonbinary, and has a transgender partner.

Agenda Item 7 — Board Member Conduct – Adam Gotschall

Reinhardt requested that the Board skip ahead to Agenda Item 7 and opened the Board's discussion about Gotschall's conduct, encouraging the Board to keep MCC's mission and its diverse community of learners in mind.

Powell told Gotschall this was not a good look for the College. She stressed that words have consequences, and his comments, which were degrading to women and people of different sexual orientations, would not be acceptable anywhere. His district's constituents expected a leader, not someone who draws the institution into personal drama. MCC has worked too hard to build its reputation and move the College forward to allow it to be damaged like this. She added, being strong sometimes means knowing when to step back. Powell supported censuring Gotschall and called for his resignation.

DuPree agreed with much of what Powell said. She believed Gotschall's remarks were misogynistic and demonstrated a clear lack of judgment. He set an example that is not aligned with MCC's values or its mission and was in direct violation of the ethical expectations held for an elected official. She told him that, as a public representative, he cannot expect the privilege of privacy, and the respectable thing for him to do was resign. DuPree supported censuring Gotschall.

Wright agreed with the statements Powell and DuPree made, saying that it takes a lifetime to build a legacy, but a moment to destroy it. She was very disappointed in his statement and hoped that he was too. Wright called for Gotschall's resignation.

Uhe began by expressing his general reluctance to overturn the will of the voters. He told Gotschall he had set a poor example for his son and was a terrible reflection on MCC. He also reminded him not to put anything on social media he wouldn't want his grandmother to read.

Monahan shared that she had gotten to know Adam over the past four years and understands that he's dealing with personal issues. She acknowledged that his son is paramount in his life and told him there is nothing wrong with saying he has more important things to focus on. She felt it would be appropriate for him to step back, reflect, and work toward making amends and earning forgiveness.

Reinhardt said that to call himself shocked, disappointed, and embarrassed by Gotschall's comments would be an understatement. There is no situation in which that kind of language is acceptable or excusable or justifiable, and he does not believe someone who chooses to use it anywhere deserves to represent a place where diversity is a core value. MCC serves ALL, and that does not just mean people from different walks of life; it also means the people we disagree with. Reinhardt said Gotschall's comments do not serve MCC's mission and echoed the sentiment that the best course of action for everyone is for Gotschall to resign his seat on the Board.

Agenda Item 7b – Consideration of Resolution to Officially Censure Board Member Adam Gotschall and Request That He Immediately Resign From His Seat on the Board of Governors, Board Doc. 8134

BE IT RESOLVED BY THIS BOARD OF GOVERNORS that it hereby officially censures Board member Adam Gotschall for comments and conduct that are unbecoming of an elected member of this Board, and which are embarrassing and

potentially damaging to the reputation of this Board, the College, and College administration.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Board officially requests that Board member Adam Gotschall immediately resign from his position on the Metropolitan Community College Board of Governors.

Agenda Item 3 — Report Agenda

Agenda Item 3a — Ex Officio Board Members' Reports

Student Ex Officio Representative Report

Samuel Pembele, student ex officio representative, shared highlights from his written report, featuring participation in the Sarpy County Campus groundbreaking ceremony and myHub training for Phi Theta Kappa officers.

Faculty Ex Officio Representative Report

Boomer Strawn, faculty ex officio representative, introduced Elise DeMaranville, Industry Training Manager, who provided a report on the SkillsUSA National Leadership and Skills Conference, held in Atlanta, Georgia June 23-27. MCC attended the conference with 19 students and 14 advisors, representing Nebraska in 15 of the 19 contest areas in which it had a presence. Competitors from the state of Nebraska brought home 26 medals. Five of those went to MCC students: Callan Scholz, gold in Power Equipment Technology; James Strawn; silver in Firefighting; Liam Blanchard, silver in Information Technology Services; Natalie Salt, bronze in Cabinetmaking; Kyle Ferguson, bronze in Collision Damage Appraisal. Each of the medal winners will receive a scholarship from MCC (\$3,000 for a gold medal win, \$2,000 for a silver medal win,

and \$1,500 for a bronze medal win) that will be available to them at the beginning of fall quarter.

Agenda 3b — Chair of the Board's Report

Reinhardt admitted he had been thinking about what to say, but a lot of his time had been spent dealing with the challenges the College was facing, so he had no strong report to give. He said there had been a lot of attention on MCC the preceding few days, but was frustrated because it was not the kind of attention MCC deserves.

Agenda 3c — Board Members' Reports

Uhe heard lots of great comments about the Sarpy County Campus groundbreaking event he attended on June 26. He commended and thanked the team behind the indoor groundbreaking for quickly and successfully pivoting to Plan B. He also congratulated Maria Vazquez, Vice President for Student Affairs, on being named one of Women We Admire's Top 50 Women Leaders of Nebraska for 2025.

Wright went to the Millwork Markets summer market series in Millwork Commons. She enjoyed seeing all of the vendors and their supporters and encouraged everyone to attend.

McDermitt reopened the Board's discussion about Gotschall's conduct, telling Gotschall he should resign, even though it was not something he wanted to do, and asking him if he could put himself in a position to do so.

Gotschall said he shared the Board's anger and frustration. He acknowledged that his comments were out of line, not reflective of his character, and not conducive to the values of the institution. He emphasized that, in the time he served on the Board, he had no issues with anyone on the Board and he believed the sentiment was mutual. He further noted that he had consistently supported every resolution and agenda item brought before the Board. Gotschall apologized for his actions. He recognized that the court of public opinion had rendered its verdict, however, and said he had issued a public statement to the Omaha World-Herald, though he was unsure if it would be published.

Love-Hug told Gotschall he's human and he made a mistake, but in this situation, it would be for the best if he would just take a step back. Gotschall reminded the Board that he'd just voted for his own censure.

Powell expressed that she did not believe Gotschall understood the depth of impact his words had. She said that, as a new Board member, she had not gotten a strong sense of leadership from him, and if she were more impressionable, she might have followed that same path. She looks to leaders to learn and grow, and actions like his that degrade and dehumanize others are not examples of leadership she wants to follow. To her, it felt like Gotschall was just holding on for the sake of holding on, but he would be

more respected if he took the high road instead of dragging others down to prove a point. In her view, if he truly cared about MCC, about its students, and about getting his personal life in order, he would resign.

Klein asked if any of MCC's philanthropic partners or other connections had commented; Schmailzl said there had been no comments from the schools but there had been from donors.

Monahan encouraged Gotschall to take a lesson from her experience with the 180 RAP luncheon. She described the event as a tremendous celebration of people who made huge mistakes and suffered severe consequences, but went through the program and became better. She told him that he did not want this moment to define his reputation for the rest of his life, and it was time for him to take a step back from this part of his life and resign.

DuPree added that one does not get to define their character when people's eyes and ears are on them; that one's true character comes out when people are not watching and listening.

Gotschall said he could have taken a different course of action, but he chose to show up to the meeting to admit and take ownership of his mistakes. He listened to everyone's comments and accepted that he had disappointed the College and the community. He felt that effort deserved some respect. McDermitt said MCC is responsible for almost 50,000 students and the Board of Governors cannot afford a member like him because more negative things are bound to follow him.

Gotschall said he appreciated everyone's comments and he had nothing further.

President Schmailzl requested a brief recess, which Reinhardt granted for 15 minutes. Following the recess, Reinhardt called the meeting back to order at 7:36 PM and asked Cari Henry to call the roll:

Agenda 3d — President's Report

Introduction of Barry Harte, Interim Chief Financial Officer

Schmailzl introduced Barry Harte, Interim Chief Financial Officer, who joined MCC in June to assess current operations, assist with Workday implementation efforts, and establish a foundation for a modernized operational structure. Schmailzl described Harte as a great fit for MCC and expressed pride in Harte's decision to join the team during this pivotal time. Harte said it is a privilege and a pleasure to be at MCC and he expressed his appreciation for the warm welcome he has received. He reported that he and his colleagues are motivated and eager to take on the work needed to move MCC forward.

Federal Funding Update

The U.S. Department of Education is withholding \$544,000 in Adult Basic Education funding that MCC expected to receive on July 1. MCC spends about \$40,000 per month to support Adult Basic Education services for about 2,000 students per year. Current operations are being maintained through the use of contingency funds. On a related note, the Department has announced that undocumented students are no longer eligible for federal funding for Adult Basic Education and Career and Technical Education programs. It also appears to be considering requiring schools to collect students' immigration status. MCC will continue to monitor this development.

The good news is that the budget reconciliation bill Congress passed on July 3, 2025, establishes the Workforce Pell Grant Program, which will expand Pell Grant access to short-term, high-demand workforce training starting in 2026–27. The reconciliation bill also widens access to standard Pell Grants without raising the eligibility cap, which will allow MCC to serve more students who would not otherwise qualify. Uhe asked if federal financial aid refunds were taxable. Julie Langholdt, Dean of Financial Aid and Compliance, said if it is within the cost of attendance, it is not taxable.

Schmailzl also mentioned the recent luncheon celebrating the 10th anniversary of MCC's 180 Re-entry Assistance Program (180 RAP), one of the leading programs in ex-offender education. Monahan attended part of the luncheon and agreed that 180 RAP is one of MCC's best programs. She said it makes a huge difference in the lives of people leaving the corrections system in Nebraska.

Agenda 3g — 2025-26 July Budget Presentation

President Schmailzl presented the Board with his proposed budget, to be accepted as the Board's own for the remainder of the budget review process. He stressed that the numbers are all estimates right now, but overall, the budget is down about 3% and student enrollment is up about 9% from 2024-25, and this should be favorable to the public.

The total budget for 2025-26 is \$267,401,187. This is calculated on four funds: General (\$155,667,537), Capital Improvement (\$51,733,650), Auxiliary (\$20,000,000), and Federal (\$40,000,000). Schmailzl gave a broad overview of each fund and noted that the projected budget for the college reserve is about double what it was for 2024-25. Budget requests were kept flat, thanks to the hard work of the College's cost center managers. Next year, when Workday's budgeting system is implemented, each cost center manager will have their own dashboard and will be able to pull up their actuals in real time in order to manage their budgets. Schmailzl acknowledged that the budget for Personnel Services is a little high at \$112,010,693. He explained that this is due to increased enrollment requiring additional staffing and a 4% salary increase across the board. The goal is to execute the budget at scale, spending between 92% and 94%, and returning remaining funds to the reserve accounts.

A required public hearing on the budget will take place in August. Since community colleges are no longer subject to the additional property tax "postcard" meetings previously required by state law, only one second required public hearing on the budget will take place in September. Schmailzl thanked Tom McKeon, Dave Hohman, and the MCC business office for their assistance with the budget.

Monahan asked if MCC has a contingency plan to address federal funding reductions. Schmailzl said there are funds in auxiliary and in the President's Office just in case, but MCC is in good shape.

Continuing Education Coordinator II – The Coordinator II works in collaboration with the supervisor and constituencies to develop and implement relevant Continuing Education programs. This position is responsible for quality control, proofing of promotional material, understanding market segments, social media campaigns and ensuring courses are in keeping with established policies. Director of Financial Planning and Analysis – The Director is a key strategic leadership position responsible for guiding the College’s financial planning, forecasting, and budgeting processes. This role requires exceptional analytical skills, collaborative leadership, and a commitment to continuous improvement that supports student success and institutional sustainability. The Director leads the College’s annual operating and multi-year capital budgeting processes, develops advanced financial models, and delivers timely, actionable insights to senior leadership. This position supports resource alignment with strategic priorities and contributes to a data-informed decision-making culture. (Ayele Vossah)

Principal Application Systems Analyst – The Principal Application Systems Analyst consults with management and helps research, design, develop, and implement software to fit clients' needs. This position must provide accurate, quality analyses of new program applications, as well as conduct testing, identify potential problems, and efficiently resolve highly complex issues. The Principal will identify products or solutions in existing and new technologies that drive automation, and subsequently develop these modifications. This position serves as a mentor to all other levels of Application Systems

Analysts, consistently demonstrating the most effective practices across all areas and job functions. (Teresa Fox)

Scholarship Coordinator – *The Scholarship Coordinator provides support and guidance to students through the scholarship processes during their educational journey at MCC. This role serves primarily on the front lines, delivering excellent customer service to support potential and current scholarship students. This position also serves as a versatile team member, assisting the Scholarship Office in various behind-the-scenes capacities to help the department achieve departmental goals of fulfilling student needs along their journey. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED *that this Board authorizes the President to execute said grant Agreement, with such modifications, changes, and amendments as the President, in consultation with College legal counsel, may deem appropriate and in the best interests of the College, to take any and all actions necessary to accept the grant funds, and to ensure implementation in accordance with the approved proposal and guidelines of the NDCS.*

Agenda Item 6d — Consideration of Resolution Approving Participation in and Acceptance of Grant Funding for Nebraska Department of Correctional Services Vocational and Pre-Apprenticeship Grant Program, Board Doc. 8129

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board accepts for review and consideration, and hereby approves the Plan to Administer the Budget for 2025-26, Board Document No. 8130a, subject to approval of the Proposed Budget Statement by the Board, and the Board directs that the Plan shall be subsequently deemed to have been amended to conform with the Proposed Budget Statement and any amendments thereto finally approved by the Board of Governors; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President and/or General Counsel of MCCA shall be the designated representative(s) to attend any public hearings or meetings on behalf of MCCA, together with a Board Member designated by the Board Chair, if required by applicable state statutes.

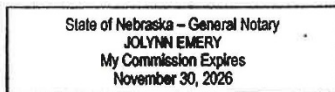
